DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

Administration

The department is administered by the Chief of Police, Chief Jeffrey Liles with the assistance of Assistant Chief of Police, Major Samuel Bierds. A graduate of Murray State University with a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice, Chief Liles has spent over 30 years as a member of the Murray Police Department. Appointed Chief of Police in 2010, Chief Liles is the longest serving Chief in Department history. In 2022, Chief Liles was named Chief of the Year by the Kentucky Association of Chiefs of Police. He serves on numerous boards throughout the community and the state.

Major Bierds has over 18 years' experience in Law Enforcement, and has been at the Murray Police Department since 2010. He was appointed Major in 2021. Major Bierds earned his Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Murray State University, and is pursuing a Master of Justice Administration degree from the University of the Cumberlands.

The Administration Division also maintains all police records. The Department's Records Custodian is Janie Green. She is responsible for the coordination and release of police records to victims, prosecutors, as well as all open records requests.

Patrol

The Patrol Division has the most visible members of the Murray Police Department and accounts for the largest portion of personnel in the department, providing around the clock coverage to the residents and visitors to Murray. The patrol officers are assigned to three shifts which are 8 hours in duration. These shifts are scheduled to maximize the available manpower during the peak periods when they are needed.

Investigations



Sergeant Angel Clere

The department's Investigations Division includes four sworn personnel. The division is directly commanded by Sergeant Angel Clere who supervises three investigators. In addition to investigating open cases after the Patrol Division takes the initial report, this division works with the Chief of Police and Assistant Chief of Police to investigate internal affairs complaints. The division also has the responsibility to process and store evidence collected from all cases. In 2022, the Investigations Division conducted numerous felony investigations, securing multiple convictions in court.





Support Services

Support Services is a versatile division, performing many duties vital to the department's mission. Sgt. Kendra Clere heads this unit. Her duties include organizing neighborhood watch programs, conducting business and residential security assessments, coordinating the Citizen's Police Academy, providing child fingerprinting services, school liaison, as well as media spokesperson for the department. Sgt. Clere also supervises the School Resource Officer program which consists of one officer each assigned to Murray High School, Murray Middle School, and Murray Elementary School for a total of 3 SRO's. The School Resource Officers are responsible for administering and coordinating the Novel McReynolds Youth Police Academy. Two sessions of the Youth Academy are conducted each summer for area school children. Sgt. Clere also serves as the Alcoholic Beverage Control Officer. She is responsible for enforcement of all regulatory statutes and ordinances, as the collection of alcohol regulatory fees.

Communications

The Communications Division includes six non-sworn personnel. This division is led by Telecommunications Team Leader Lisa Starks under the oversight of Major Bierds. The telecommunications personnel for the department must attend the five-week basic Telecommunications Course offered by the Kentucky Department of Criminal Justice Training in Richmond, KY, unless they have an active certification from KY DOCJT upon hire. After the basic training course is successfully completed, telecommunications personnel are required to attend 8 hours of annual training to maintain certification, however, other continuing education beyond this mandatory 8 hours is encouraged. Telecommunications personnel also complete a 3-week in-house field training course before being permitted to work without oversight of a certified telecommunicator. This Field Training program for telecommunicators has the flexibility to be expanded to five weeks or more, depending on their skill level. In June of 2015 the Communications Division was among the first in Kentucky to be accredited as a Telecommunications Center by the Kentucky Association of Chiefs of Police (KACP). The Communications Division is preparing to apply for re-accreditation in June of 2024.



Budget and Funding

The Murray Police Department presently operates on an annual budget of \$3,786,153. We have also been able to fund many equipment upgrades through federal and state grants. In 2023 we will be continuing to provide, in partnership with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, overtime traffic enforcement in high collision areas throughout the city. We have been fortunate to receive this grant from the Commonwealth for several years and will continue in 2023.

Accreditation

In 2007 the Murray Police Department became an accredited agency by the Kentucky Association of Chiefs of Police. Accreditation reflects that an agency was carefully measured against an established set of standards and has met or exceeded professionally accepted practices in law enforcement. The accreditation standing must be reapplied for every five years. In 2012, 2017, and 2022, the Murray Police Department was successful in gaining approval for re-accreditation which will ensure the department will continue its accredited status through 2027.



Facility

The Murray Police Department has been located 104 N 5th Street for 4 years. During that time, the Department has hosted numerous trainings conducted by the Department of Criminal Justice Training, the Kentucky League of Cities, and the Kentucky Association of Chiefs of Police. The Kentucky Law Enforcement Council also conducts written suitability testing at our facility. The Murray Police Department is recognized across the state as an excellent location to conduct law enforcement training and testing.





Community Involvement

The Murray Police Department policing philosophy has been and will continue to be a community-oriented style of policing. Murray Police Department has participated and assisted in facilitating many community events. The Murray Police Department hosts an annual Community Night in cooperation and partnership with many local agencies, organizations and businesses. In 2023, we will once again host our quarterly Coffee with a Cop events at local restaurants where officers meet with and address concerns of citizens and visitors of the City of Murray. Community partnerships are vital to successful policing.











Body Worn Cameras

In 2021, MPD began to seek funding to assist with the program's cost. We were awarded an \$80,000 grant through the Small-Rural-Tribal Body Worn Camera Program administered by the Bureau of Justice Assistance. MPD was one of only six law enforcement agencies in Kentucky that were awarded grant funding through this program.

The Murray Police Department will use BWCs to achieve five goals:

- To assist in providing further information on potential crimes in progress, whether perpetrated against the officer or the community and to maintain this evidence for presentation in court.
- To assist in the initial police response, the discovery of evidentiary items and the actions of police pursuant to an investigation.
- To assist in the documentation of victim, witness, or suspect statements pursuant to an on-scene response and/or document advisement of rights, if applicable.
- To assist in investigations of complaints made against officers in the course of their police duties.
- To assist as a training and performance mechanism which will contribute to the professionalism of all Murray Police Officers.

The Murray Police Department developed a comprehensive policy for the use of BWCs. MPD reviewed policies from multiple agencies nationwide and the model policy from the Kentucky League of Cities. In addition, MPD consulted with several agencies already using BWCs to learn about policy and operational issues they encountered when implementing their programs. The Department's legal advisors reviewed the MPD policy before being approved by Chief Liles. The policy addresses several areas, including when officers should activate their BWCs, how the video footage should be retained and released, privacy concerns associated with BWC footage, the general operation of the technology, supervisor review of BWC footage, and other issues associated with the Department's BWC program.

Response to Active Resistance

"All Murray Police Department Officers shall recognize that the sanctity of human life serves as the guiding principle in response to resistance decisions."

- MPD Policy 1104 Response to Active Resistance

The Murray Police Department strives to conduct law enforcement operations in a safe manner, utilizing as little force as possible to achieve lawful goals. De-escalation and verbal persuasion are the preferred methods to reduce the intensity of a conflict or potentially violent situation. This is the first and most commonly used level of force. However, there are times when physical force is required to safely gain control of an actively resisting suspect, or to protect the officer or others from injury. Physical force consists of increasing levels of severity:

- Soft empty hand control are Techniques that have a low potential of injury to the subject.
 For example, an officer's use of hands to direct a subject's movement. This is the appropriate level of force for a passively resisting suspect.
- OC Spray is a chemical agent derived from hot pepper plants. It is to be used only on suspects who are actively resisting and/or displaying active aggression. Officers are recertified on its use annually.
- The Taser is an electronic control weapon designed to be a less lethal force option. It is to be used only on suspects who are actively resisting and/or displaying active aggression. Officers are recertified on its use annually.
- Physical force (holding, pulling, pushing, striking, exerting great strength) may be used and actively resisting/actively aggressive suspect for the purposes self-defense, defense of others, and/or to safely effect an arrest. Chokeholds and neck restraints are prohibited by the Murray Police Department unless deadly force is justified.
- Batons are formidable impact weapons generally used against aggressive, unarmed suspects when other levels of control have failed or have been deemed to be inadequate. Officers are recertified on the use of batons annually.
- Deadly force is only authorized in order to prevent death or serious physical injury to the officer or others. Officers qualify with firearms twice annually in regular and low light conditions.

All Officers of the Murray Police Department have an affirmative duty to intervene if they witness a response to resistance that is clearly unreasonable. They are required to not only intervene at the time of the incident, but to report the situation to a supervisor as well. Officers are trained on this policy annually.



Whenever force is used by an officer, they are required to document its use. That report is reviewed by the officer's supervisor, as well as the Chief of Police. In 2022, less than 0.05% of the more than 15,000 service calls answered by MPD officers, and less than 1.7% of arrests resulted in force.


